



INTEGRATED WATER MANAGEMENT

WATER MANAGEMENT at Rockspire is moving forward with the reconstruction of one of the mountaintop ponds. The Upper West Pond is the first of several ponds to be reconstructed for the purpose of water management as outlined in the Rockspire Manifesto. When completed, this pond will serve as a source of drinking water for livestock and the site for aquaculture through the harvesting of freshwater fish.

Water is a transient natural resource and is always in motion unless encapsulated as ice. By using the wind to pump water from a pond in the valley to this mountaintop pond, water will flow from this pond down the mountainside toward Betty's Birdhouse and back to the pond in the valley where it circulates upward again. As the water flows down the mountainside over cascading waterfalls, micro-hydro electric generators will produce electricity for use in Rockspire's homes and facilities.



JOAN MYERS NORTON, one of the founding members of Rockspire, passed away April 4, 2013 after an in-home accident on March 17. A service of worship in witness to the resurrection and in celebration of Joan's life was held at the MobbyMac Carriage House at Rockspire on April 13 with the Rev. Stewart Smith officiating.
