THE NATURE CONSERVANCY (TNC) is working to improve the quality of the environment in and around the Kings River watershed near Rockspire. Their Kings River Preserve has recently expanded with the purchase of the nearby, Whispering Wings Ranch.

Mike Johnson and George Myers represented Rockspire at a meeting held by the Arkansas Chapter of The Nature Conservancy to inform and consult neighbors as to the direction and plans for the Kings River Preserve, and more specifically the Whispering Wings Ranch property. About 30 neighbors and TNC staff members attended the meeting which generated a meaningful discussion about the future of the area. In general, the group liked the idea of opening the area for public hiking, biking, and canoeing. However, there was some concern about allowing overnight camping.

In addition to discussing the future use of the Kings River Preserve, TNC updated the group on its progress to restore the riverbank known as the Oxbow Project. The natural course and riparian corridor of the river have been significantly modified over several decades, leading to channel instability and decreased habitat and water quality. The Arkansas chapter of The Nature Conservancy has been working on this large-scale restoration project to help reduce sedimentation and improve habitat for several species. The restoration site is one-half mile long, and is located on one of the most heavily used canoeing stretches of the Kings River. This project was made possible by funding from the Southeast Aquatic Resources Partnership, Walmart Stormwater Compliance Program, and Tyson Foods, Inc.
