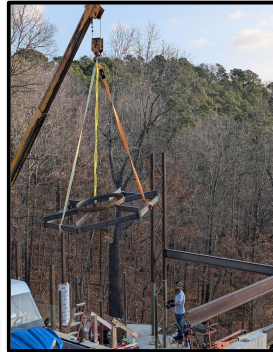

Rockspire: Reflections after 28 Years

As we welcome a new year, we'd like to look back on Rockspire's journey since its founding in 1997. What began as the shared vision of two Dallas architects is now becoming a unique community, woven into 125 acres of preserved natural beauty.

Rockspire's secluded setting, surrounded by nature preserves and proximity to Eureka Springs and other regional cultural centers, offers us the best of both worlds—tranquility and connection. The property's diverse landscape includes panoramic mountaintop views, open pastures, natural springs, hardwood forests, dramatic cliffs, and even a cave with a storied past linked to local moonshining traditions.

From the outset, the goal was clear: to create a place where art, architecture, and innovation exist in harmony with nature. Guided by these founding principles, Rockspire has always prioritized:

- A limited number of permanent residences, complemented by guest cabins and campsites
- Environmentally sustainable design and construction
- Enhancement and protection of water resources
- Agricultural initiatives to support community food needs
- Shared amenities such as trails, gardens, studios, and event spaces
- Integration of natural design with advanced technology for responsible development
- Community involvement beyond the limitations of a single place or idea

Throughout the years, ***The Rockspirian*** has chronicled our progress and ongoing commitment to these ideals. Rather than adhering to a rigid master plan, Rockspire has chosen to evolve organically, growing at its own pace, guided by the needs of the land and the aspirations of its community. This approach has not always been easy, but after 28 years, it's clear that we remain true to our founding vision.

As we look to the future, Rockspire continues to thrive as a living laboratory for thoughtful, sustainable community development—proof that with patience, creativity, and respect for nature, a dream can flourish for generations to come.
